

Abeer Otman Phd, is a Palestinian mother, social worker, and researcher. Born and raised in Palestine, she has spent the past 23 years living and working in Occupied East Jerusalem (OEJ). Her postdoctoral research examines father-child relationships under conditions of intense militarization and genocide. Abeer Otman advances a decolonial critique of hegemonic frameworks of fatherhood by centering Palestinian father-child relationalities amidst the ongoing Zionist settler-colonial genocide in Gaza. Dominant scholarship on paternal roles, shaped by White, Western, middle-class contexts, obscures the ways that colonial violence, dispossession, and militarization fundamentally reconfigure fatherhood in Palestine. Decolonial psychology must attend to Palestinian-rooted epistemologies that teach us to rethink care, kinship, and survival beyond liberal-humanist frames, and to recognize in these relational practices an insistence on life itself amidst genocide.
